Making Time For Children

wo employees at
The Post made it a
priority this year to
get involved in the
life of a child as a mentor.
WENDY EVANS, Advertising/New York Bureau, and
KARISUE WYSON, Writers
Group, brushed up on elementary and middle school math
to help a 13-year-old girl in
New York City and an eightyear-old boy in Alexandria, Va.

A Manhattan resident, Evans volunteers for Pantry Sisters, a Harlem-based nonprofit organization for girls that offers a variety of after school programs including dance, academic tutoring and mentoring.

"The girls are in schools that are in low income areas and are struggling with their studies. Pantry Sisters recruits girls to be in the program – the kids you are working with are committed to getting better and they really want to learn more," explained Evans.

This past September, Evans was matched with Melissa, who wanted help with her math. Evans met with Melissa in a church in Harlem every Monday evening.

"She was very shy at first,"

said Evans. "She was behind in a lot of areas, but we focused on how she could improve her skills in math, and other things, like how she could be more comfortable talking to her teacher after class, if she didn't understand an assignment."

"I let her drive our sessions together and she decided that rather than focus on her homework, she wanted to learn some of the math she didn't feel she understood at all. We would talk about ideas on how to use the math, like using fractions for cooking. I would come to the next session with recipes and try to give her a practical application for what she was learning."

At the end of the school year, Evans felt like she had developed a good relationship with Melissa and often had conversations with the young teenager on other topics including boys and making friends. "I really had fun," she noted. "You can never know how a relationship will develop."

Karisue Wyson became a child's mentor after hearing a speech last year by (now Secretary of State) Colin Powell about his program, "America's Promise."

"He said in his speech that it is your job as a responsible adult to make sure that you are involved in some way with a child at least once a week - in a positive way. Soon after I heard the speech, my church was looking for substitute teachers for Sunday school, so I volunteered. Through that, a woman at my church asked if I was interested in helping tutor students at George Mason Elementary (Alexandria). I didn't think I would be able to because it was in the afternoon, but she was able to find a boy who was dropped off at school early."

Throughout the school year, Wyson rose early every Wednesday morning to meet Toure, a second grader,

at 7 a.m. to help him with his math homework.

"I'm terrible at math, but that is what he needed help in and I figured I could handle second grade math. It actually worked out well though, because I would watch him stumble in exactly the same way I did – when you just don't get it." She explained. "I was able to tell him that I did exactly the same thing and that I knew how hard it was."

Wyson enjoyed her work with Toure so much that she hopes to work with him and another child when school starts again in September.
