Downie describes the book as an analysis of the crossroads facing the news media today. It gives readers an intimate look inside the news business, including newspapers, as well as local and network television.

He explains, "The best

journalism is better than it has ever been. The best journalists are better educated, more professional, better trained and more expert in the subjects they cover than ever before. And thanks to the Internet, good journalism can reach more people. At the same time, the majority of news organizations are not getting better and their news coverage is getting worse for a variety of reasons, including ownership patterns. So much of the news media is owned by large conglomerates for which profit is more important than the quality of their news."

Downie and Kaiser will be visiting universities and journalism schools across the country as part of the promotional tour for the book. They will also be discussing and signing the book at bookstores, including an appearance at Politics & Prose in the District on March 5.
