Two More Pulitzers!

inutes after the Pulitzer Prize awards were announced at 3 p.m. on Monday, April 8, Executive Editor LEN **DOWNIE** announced that The Post had received two of the prestigious awards. The first was for Investigative Reporting for a series that exposed the District's role in the neglect and deaths of foster children in its care. The second Pulitzer was for National Reporting for comprehensive coverage on the war on terrorism. The Post also had five other finalists in the Pulitzer judging.

The announcement of the two awards was met with thunderous

applause in the Newsroom crowded with employees from throughout the building. And, for the first

time, staff at the Metro bureaus received a live broadcast of the announcement and remarks. The two new Pulitzer Prizes bring the total won by The Post to 33. The newspaper received its first Pulitzer in 1938

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"The staff of The Washington Post produced some of its most outstanding journalism ever during the past

year," noted Downie. "Hundreds of you throughout the Newsroom and our bureaus everywhere contributed to simply extraordinary coverage of the September 11 terrorist attacks and their aftermath that has helped both our readers and the govern-

ment cope with this national crisis. At the same time, you continued to produce high-impact investigative reporting that has held governments accountable to their citizens and made a real difference in people's lives." A Metro staff investigation into the deaths of children under the care of the District's child protection services earned the Pulitzer for Investigative Reporting. The package of stories

was written by staff writers SARI HORWITZ and SCOTT HIGHAM, with database editor SARAH COHEN. Downie called the series of stories, "journalism that has made a difference for those most in need of it."

In her remarks, JO-ANN ARMAO, assistant managing editor for Metro, thanked her staff for their work, "They (Horwitz, Higham and Cohen) would not have been able to do what they did if they were not part of a staff that each and every day comes to work determined to do their finest. From the biggest breaking story to the tiniest news item, it is a staff dedi-

The Pulitzer for National Reporting was awarded for a package of stories on the war against terrorism that was written by National Desk staff, including BOB WOODWARD, AMY GOLDSTEIN, BART GELLMAN, DAN EGGEN, SUSAN SCHMIDT, TOM RICKS, KAREN DEYOUNG and WALTER PINCUS.

"Much of the war on terrorism that began after the September 11 attacks has been a secret war, explained Downie. "The National staff...with help from reporters and editors from throughout the Newsroom - consistently penetrated that secrecy to inform Americans and lead the rest of the news media with one breakthrough story after another. This was made possible by the calm, creative and decisive leadership of National AME (assistant managing editor) LIZ SPAYD and National Editor MIKE ABRAMOWITZ ... Their performance has simply been remarkable."

Downie also noted the contributions of Woodward who broke off a book project to

come into the Newsroom on September 11 to help, and be-

came the lead reporter on many of the stories. Woodward, with a roar of laughter in the Newsroom, mentioned the contributions of many staff, including National editor **LEONARD** BERNSTEIN, and said, "I always feel uncomfortable working on a big story without a Bernstein." He also

praised Investigations Editor JEFF LEEN, "In 30 years in the business, I have never seen anyone who is such a great conceptual editor or can execute with such great skill. He is an extraordinary talent."

Woodward and the other speakers also praised the un-

failing support of Chairman **DON GRAHAM** and Publisher **BO JONES**. Associate Counsel **ERIC LIEBERMAN** was also thanked for his legal work that contributed to the award-winning stories. After the two Pulitzer Prizes were announced, Managing Editor **STEVE COLL** congratulated the five Pulitzer finalists, (see box). "Altogether we placed seven Pulitzer finalists this year, and we are as proud of the five entries that did not win as we are of the two that did."

Three of the staff who are sharing the two Pulitzer Prizes have also been on Pulitzer winning

teams in previous years. Sari Horwitz was part of the team that received the Pulitzer for Public Service in 1999 for an investigative series of stories about the unusually high rate of shootings by the D.C. Police Department. While at the *Wall Street Journal*, Tom Ricks was on the staff that

In his closing remarks, Downie noted, "Prizes are a nice, tangible reward for this journalism, but they are not the reason we do it. We do it to make a difference."


