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ost of them were born a decade after the Pentagon Papers and Watergate scandals, yet this group of college students listened intently as BEN BRADLEE, vice president/at large and former executive editor, shared details of what it was like to work in The Post's newsroom and to be in Washington in the early 1970s. Bradlee was the guest speaker on July 10 for one of the news interns weekly lunches, giving the students an opportunity to hear about the lessons learned by another generation of journalists.

"The secret of this business

is to work hard, get your stories in the paper, and have a good time. It's an exciting way to earn a living," was the advice Bradlee gave them before they headed back to work - to file stories, edit copy, take photos, or design a page of The Post.

TOM WILKINSON, assistant managing editor of career development, oversees the news internship program and describes it as a hands-on learning program, although he emphasizes, it is definitely not for beginners. This year's 21 interns have already earned impressive resumes, often with several internships behind them

> before they come to The Post. This year's group was handpicked from a pool of more than 550 applications.

"The deadline for the applications is November 1 and we take a preliminary read on the applications and try to cut the number to half or more," he explained. "CHERYL BUTLER, [director of recruiting] and JUDY HAVEMANN [director of recruit-

ment] coordinate the process. The remaining applications are sent to the editors of the desks where the applicant indicated they are interested in working."

After the editors make their choices, the final list of interns is reviewed by Executive Editor LEN DOWNIE; Managing Editor STEVE COLL; Deputy Managing Editor MILTON COLEMAN and Wilkinson. The selected interns are then notified in December. "We have moved our schedule up for selecting interns, because other newspapers have moved theirs. We want to make sure we get the best interns," he added.

According to Wilkinson, one of the biggest benefits that the interns bring to the newsroom is a young perspective. "The interns are in touch with what matters to their age group of readers. They bring stories we might not normally do...about what is going on in their world."


Georgetown University. Fortyone essays were received and the winners were picked from three categories: high school, college and graduate school.
