## Post Gets New Security System

The Post has begun to install a new state-of-the-art security system in the Northwest Building and College Park and Springfield plants that is designed to provide a more secure working environment for employees.

The system was in the planning and development stages prior to last

been a true commitment to making employees safe and no resources were compromised in pursuit of that goal."

The most visible change as the new system is implemented over the next several weeks will be a new ID and access card for employees, as well as long-term contractors and consultants. Beginning Tuesday, Oct. 8, staff at the Northwest Building began getting photos taken for the new card. Each department is being provided with scheduled appointment times for the new photos. At the time the photo is taken, the employee must hand in their existing ID card. The cards are company property and can not be saved by an employee as a Post memento.

For those squeamish about getting their photo taken, Security has taken extra measures to provide each employee with a flattering photo. According to Floyd, the department consulted with Assistant Managing Editor/Photo **JOE ELBERT** and Picture Editor **MICHEL DUCILLE** for advice on taking the photos, including lighting and equipment.

The new ID access cards, according to company policy, must be visibly displayed on the employee. In the next two to three weeks, employees will have to use their ID access card to gain entrance through a turnstile to enter the main lobby of the Northwest Building, the Northwest Building garage, the Akridge

year's Sept. 11 attack and anthrax scare, according to Administrative Services Manager **RICK FLOYD**. However, the process of implementing the system was escalated as a result of employees' security concerns related to those incidents.

"This new system is comparable to what the Federal government is using," said Security Manager **GARY CORSO**, who was hired by The Post last month to oversee the Security Department. "There has

Building, as well as other secure areas including computer rooms. Please Note: Employees will be able to exit, but not enter the Northwest Building via the L Street entrance. Entry to the College Park and Springfield plants will also require ID access cards.

Access to areas will be different for each employee. For example, access to departments in the Akridge Building will be limited to staff who have regular business in the building and only people who park in the Northwest Building garage will have access to that area. 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# Open Enrollment Begins Oct. 28

Most employees will see a few changes and additions to the newspaper's benefits package when open enrollment packages are delivered to each department and distributed to staff next week, beginning Monday, Oct. 21. During the open enrollment period Monday, Oct. 28 to Sunday, Nov. 10, employees will have the opportunity to update and change their benefits package for the calendar year 2003.

The following is a brief overview of some of the changes and additions:

- **The Aetna Healthfund (TM) Account** - A new medical plan that is designed to give an employee more control and responsibility for their health care costs. The Post will deposit \$500 per person covered by your policy (up to \$1,500 for

family coverage) in your Healthfund account each year to pay for covered medical expenses. If your expenses are below the amount in your account, the remainder of the money will be rolled over to your Healthfund account the following year, as long as you are enrolled in the plan.

However if you exceed the amount in the account, you must meet a large deductible before additional health care expenses are covered, with the exception of a separate preventative care allowance of \$300 per person covered by your policy. Employees are encouraged to carefully read the flexible benefits program enrollment guide for more information about the Healthfund account.

- **Increase in Well-Baby Visits** - Coverage of well-baby visits for a child's second year has been increased from one to two visits. This change reflects current medical standards and practices.
- **In-Vitro Fertilization Maximum Increased** - The maximum life-

time limit an employee can receive for in-vitro fertilization treatments has been increased from \$10,000 to \$20,000. The change is due to the cost increase for the procedures.

- **Increased Coverage for Speech Therapy** - Beginning Jan. 1, 2003, the Aetna Open Choice PPO will cover a maximum of 30 speech therapy visits annually. Speech therapy needed for a developmental delay will be covered as long as it is medically necessary and a doctor's referral is obtained.

- **Family Coverage: Revised Out-of-Pocket Maximum** - Beginning Jan. 1, 2003, for families covered by the Aetna Open Choice PPO, the formula for figuring out-of-pocket maximums has been simplified. One family member must meet the specified out of pocket maximum. The family's remaining out of pocket maximum can be met by any combination of covered family members. This applies to both in-network and out-of-network coverage.

- **New Copays for the Advance PCS Prescription Plan** - To encourage the use of generic prescription drugs when appropriate, a tiered prescription drug copay plan with costs ranging from \$10 -\$35 is outlined in your open enrollment benefits package. The copay formula for mail order prescriptions remains two times the prescription drug copay for a 90-day supply.

- **Improved Long Term Care Coverage Coming in 2003** - The Benefits Department will be introducing an improved long-term care coverage option later in 2003.

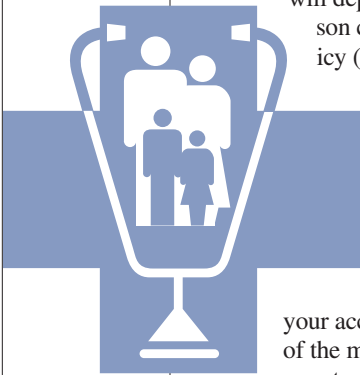
Another change in open enrollment that employees will experience this year is that enrollment will take

place on a new benefits Web site at [www.wponet.com](http://www.wponet.com). Beginning on Oct. 28, Staff can enroll online on the site 24 hours a day, seven days a week from any computer that has an Internet connection and a Netscape Navigator (version 6.2 or higher) or a Microsoft Internet Explorer (versions 5.5 or higher) browser. If you do not have access to a computer,

they will be available for your use during open enrollment at both of the plants and in the Benefits Department in the Northwest Building. To access [www.wponet.com](http://www.wponet.com) for open enrollment, you will need your user ID and the password that will appear on your benefits fact sheet in the open enrollment packet. After you enroll, you will be able to print out a copy of your elected coverage for your files. You can call the Benefits Department at x4-7171 if you misplace your password.

During the open enrollment period, the staff will be available during extended hours, 9 a.m. to 8 p.m., Monday through Friday, to answer your open enrollment questions at x4-7171 [(202) 334-7171]. The staff will also be at the College Park and Springfield plants during the open enrollment week to assist employees. The dates and times for open enrollment assistance and the location of computers available for open enrollment will be posted on bulletin boards and on posters at the plants.



access card, your vice president must provide written permission to the Security Department.

“The system is integrated with Human Resources’ software,” said Floyd. “An employee just has to give their name and we can download their access information on the card. It only takes three minutes to get a new card.”

The new security system is making some changes necessary in the lobby of the Northwest Building. A turnstile will be placed at the entrance to the main elevator lobby and the Security Desk will be moved to the outer lobby. Visitors to The Post will be greeted in the

outer lobby and provided with a timed access visitor ID card. Visitors must be accompanied by a Post employee before they can enter the main lobby.

The new system will also enable the Security Department to have digital video monitoring 24 hours a day throughout The Post’s facilities including several stairwells, the lobbies and the garage. Using digital technology, Security staff will be able to type in a date and time and have instant access to the activity that took place in that

as to what to do depending on the circumstance. More information about the security system will be forthcoming from the Security Department. Floyd and Corso have requested that employees be patient as the new security system is put in place. “The impact on employees should be minor,”

said Floyd. “Most of what is being put in place to increase security will not affect staff as they do their jobs.”

## POST SCRIPTS



The Post was without an editorial cartoonist from the beginning of 1943 until 1946. According to Katharine Graham in her autobiography "Personal History" her father and Post Publisher Eugene Meyer was looking for a cartoonist and "heard about a man just coming out of the army who, before the war, had drawn cartoons for the Chicago Daily News..." Graham noted that when her father met Herb Block at the Yale Club in New York, he asked Block if he could see some of his work. In return, Meyer sent Block a subscription to The Post. According to Graham, Block found The Post to be "interesting and inviting" and he was hired. His first cartoon for The Post was published January 3, 1946. Block worked for The Post for 55 years until his death in October 2001.
