
Post Wins Several Press Awards

everal Post staff were recipients of the Virginia Press Association (VPA) 2002 Awards announced on Saturday, March 8 in Norfolk. According to an article by **PETER WHORISKEY** in the March 13 Fairfax Extra, the VPA contest annually attracts more than 5,000 entries in dozens of categories, making it one of the largest news contests in the nation.

DAN BALZ and **BOB WOODWARD** won the best-inshow writing award for "10 Days in

September," their retrospective on the events of Sept. 11, 2001. Best-inshow winners are chosen from among the first-place winners in all categories of writing, photography and artwork and from the general makeup category in the presentation division.

During the 2002 Maryland-Delaware-DC Press Association awards ceremony held on Friday, March 14, in Wilmington, Del., The Post was named newspaper

of the year in division A (daily newspapers with a circulation of more than 75,000). The Post received the award for coverage of last year's sniper shootings, the death penalty, problems with the local United Way organization and a deadly battle with a shark.

The Post staff won the two top prizes in the spot news category for sniper coverage. Coverage of the arrest of the two suspects took first place, and coverage of the initial day of the shootings took second.

A team of Post reporters who detailed the impact of the death penalty won in the general news category. The team included PATRICIA DAVIS, BROOKE MASTERS, MARIA GLOD, JOSH WHITE and TOM JACKMAN.

Other Post first-place winners were: **HAMIL HARRIS** for coverage of religion; **JACQUELINE SALMON** and Peter Whoriskey for continuing coverage of problems within the United Way;

ANNE HULL for a series on the evolving face of America; MICHAEL RUANE for a feature story on the death of a shark fisherman, and JUSTIN BLUM in the local government category for a story that explained how lawyers profited through their in-


