A Funny Thing Happened...

funny thing happened last July to **CHRIS WHITE**, manager of editorial production for The Post's Writer's Group. He picked up the July 5 Weekend section featuring the comedy scene in the D.C. and open mike nights for aspiring comedians. Less then a year later, he is a vet-

eran comedian who has performed at several area clubs and has also taken his talents up the road to Baltimore.

"I was always sort of interested in doing stand up, but I never tried it," he explains. "The Weekend section listed an open mike night in Northern Virginia at Wiseacres in Tysons Corner. After checking it out, I actually got on stage for the first time at the end of August."

"It was pretty nerve wracking," he added. "I'm not a particularly good public speaker. There were probably 25 people in the audience and I had memorized everything the way I wanted it...I had no idea if any of it was going to work. My legs were really

> shaking and I was glad I was wearing baggy jeans. But I got the first joke out and the rest went fine."

White continued to do open mike nights for four months and worked on new material. He also met other comedians, many of

who do their own shows at local bars and restaurants and more opportunities opened up for him to perform.

Some of those opportunities include performing in front of 300 people in March at the D.C. Improv, just a few blocks away from the Northwest Building. That same month he traveled to participate in a contest at the Pittsburgh Improv and had a show

at his alma mater, the University of Richmond.

May was another busy month for White. For one night he held the title of "funniest person in D.C." after winning a stand up contest at a club in Adams-Morgan. White also performed at the Baltimore Improv and landed two on-air "gigs" on the morning show for Baltimore radio station 98 Rock. These came about after he met one the radio show's hosts, Kirk McKewen, at a comedy show.

"Everything in comedy is about connections," he said. "If you happen to be at the right show with the right person, something cool happens - you get to go to Baltimore and be on the radio."

As he was launching his

comedic career, White noticed that there were very few good resources for information on comedy in the area, both for comedians getting into the business and audiences in search of a good laugh. Using information he had compiled, in January he launched dcstandup.com, a web site that includes a calendar of shows, venues and a sprinkling of jokes. According to White, at first the content was provided by him and three friends, and now there are about 30 local comedians providing information and content.

"Performing stand up has given me a chance to get out and meet new friends," White commented, "and, a lot of strange people, too."


