

1150 15th Street, N.W. nears completion and the final phase gets underway. The renovation project is headed by Vice President/Counsel MARY ANN WERNER and project managers LISA HEIDEMANN and BILL GARD.

The renovations that are currently underway in the 32-year-old building are located on the 3rd and 2nd floors. The 3rd floor was previously the mailroom when there was a production facility in the building (which closed in 1999) and until recently was the site for large events such as the Eugene Meyer

Awards and 20-Year Club reception. According to Gard, the renovated floor will house approximately 200 IT staff who are currently scattered throughout different floors and in the Akridge Building.

A team of IT staff headed by **BILL LIBERTI**, director of IT client services, has been responsible for the design of the space which includes open areas where IT staff can congregate in a casual setting with laptop computers and collaborate on projects. The plan features windowed offices and a number of conference rooms. Other staff working on the design of the new IT area include **DIONNE COHEE**, **SHARON DIBBERN** and **ANTHONY**

SHEETZ. The IT Department is expected to begin moving into the 3rd floor at the end of this month.

The 2nd floor renovation project is creating a space that will house a large assembly area and a separate banquet area accessible from the outer lobby of the building. "We've outgrown the 9th floor community room and needed a large new space," noted Werner.

LISA BOLTON, manager of public relations, was involved in the design of the space, which will also be used for many community events. The area includes a small room for group tours, a museum room, as well as conference and

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training rooms. "Many staff contributed time and effort into planning to make the new community room a gathering place we are proud of. The individual commitment to this group effort is what makes the project fun, challenging and successful," explained Bolton. The 2nd floor is scheduled to be completed in time for the publisher's expanded staff meeting scheduled for later this month.

The exodus of IT staff from the 7th floor will make way for the final phase of the renovations which will include the 7th, 8th and 9th floors and is anticipated to last until the end of the year, according to Werner. Staff located on those floors will move to temporary quarters.

In about a month, the Executive staff will move down three levels to the same location on the 4th floor. The Public Relations and Human Resources departments will relocate into "swing" space on the 3rd floor of the L Street side of the building. The Corporate staff now on the 8th floor will move to the 4th floor of the Akridge Building along with staff from The Post's Writers Group.

The area of the 7th floor where the Accounting
Department is located will be unaffected because it has already been renovated.

At the completion of the final phase, the staff in the affected departments are expected to return to approximately the same area of those floors. In addition, the Circulation Department will vacate the 11th and 12th floors of the

Akridge Building and move to the 7th floor. Werner noted that the consolidation of the IT Department and moving the Circulation Department back into the main building were the two main driving forces behind the renovations.

Also underway is a project to move the mail desk operation. The mail desk on the 3rd floor will be consolidated with the 1st floor receiving area to a new location on the 1st floor which will also have an entrance for couriers and postal deliveries. According to Werner, the new mail desk will have a separate ventilation system from the rest of the building and make the building more secure from anthrax threats and other potential hazards. The Newsroom's mail area, which also has a separate ventilation area, will remain on the 4th floor.

Construction is expected to begin in about a year on a new 12-story office building where the outdoor two-level parking deck now stands. The Post completed the sale of the land where the garage sits to District-based developer Monument Realty on Dec. 22. Post staff writer **NEIL IRWIN** reported in a Business section story on Dec. 18 that the building envisioned for the site will be approximately 400,000 square feet and will take about two years to complete. The completion of the Northwest Building's indoor parking garage in September 2002 provided the newspaper the opportunity to sell the lot, according to Werner. •
