Funny Business

espite the bleak damp weather, there was plenty of funny business on the 9th floor of the Northwest Building on Friday, Feb. 6. The Post Writers Group hosted the aspiring syndicated cartoonists who are the 2004 FineToon Fellows for a professional development seminar.

This year's fellows and their strips include Valerie Costantino, "V.J. and Company," the story of an unpublished romance novelist who moonlights as a bartender. "Steve" is a creation of Dan Killeen about a little blue guy with amazing powers of imagination. Todd Machen is the creator of "Attack of the Killer Soccer Moms," about suburban soccer moms (and dads), and "Loose Nuts" which was reminiscent of the "Far Side" is in development by Steve Skelton.

For Dave Killeen, receiving the

FineToon Fellowship this year has been a creative boost in the development of his strip. "It flipped on a green light for my writing," he said. "Just to know there are editors at The Post who like my strip has been empowering."

The fellowship, which began in 2000, provides the cartoonists with the opportunity to learn the business of comic strip syndication from Post staff and professionals from other publications. The fellows also receive a stipend of \$5,000 and are mentored by successfully syndicated cartoonists. At the conclusion of the fellowship, the Writers Group has the first right of refusal to syndicate the strips. A strip that was successfully developed through the FineToon Fellowship is "Out of the Gene Pool," a Writers Group syndicated strip which appears in The Post's comics pages. The strip is created by Matt

Janz, a 2000 FineToon Fellow. The fellowship is coordinated by Writers Group Comics Editor **SUZANNE WHELTON**.

Last week's seminar was the first of three FineToon Fellow seminars that will be held throughout the year. The cartoonist began the day meeting with the Writers Group editorial and sales staff learning about the syndication business. Topics included the role of the syndicate, promotion and marketing strategies, the editing process and deadlines. In the afternoon, the cartoonists met with SHIRLEY **CARSWELL**, assistant managing editor/administration and planning and Susan Bischoff, an associate editor for the Houston Chronicle in Texas. Carswell and Bischoff discussed and answered questions about the comics that run in The Post and Chronicle.

Notice About Northwest Building Water

To All Employees: Because of recent reports about lead in the D.C. water supply, here is an update about the water in the Northwest building. A number of years ago, filtration systems were installed on the building's water fountains and in some other areas, and those filters are designed to be effective against lead. Drinking water in newly renovated areas of the building will be filtered as well. The cafeteria also has a filtration system for its cold water supply, including the ice machine and drink machines. Tap water in the building's restrooms is not filtered in that way. There is no information indicating that there is a problem with lead in our water, but water quality tests are being conducted to gather more information.
