

Post Wins Pulitzer! Applebaum Also Wins Pulitzer for Book

By Carrie Morse, Public Relations n Monday, April 5, a special call from Baghdad, Iraq came into the 5th floor Newsroom. At one end of the phone was Post reporting. Standing nearby was editorial writer **Anne Applebaum** who was awarded the Pulitzer prize for non-fiction for her book *Gulag: A History*.

Downie began his remarks, "The most important news story of the

past year was the war in Iraq and its aftermath. The Washington Post covered it better than any other news organization. And, among all the great work that everyone did in helping to cover Iraq, one journalist's work especially stood out. Today, that journalist, Washington Post foreign correspondent Anthony Shadid, has won the Pulitzer


ordered their correspondents to leave. Shadid once told his editor that he had prepared his entire career for a story like Iraq.

> Downie said, "He did not simply lead the pack, but struck out in a direction where few could follow. And, I would add, he wrote about what he saw and heard in an eloquent, evocative, involving way that places his work among the best foreign correspondence of our time."

Shadid addressed the newsroom by speakerphone from Baghdad. He began by saying, "It's really an overwhelming moment. About 10:30 tonight, about 2:30 your time, I was sitting in front of the computer with probably about the tenth cup of coffee trying to figure out what the lead would be. Then a bomb goes off outside and I kind of had that feeling that things don't change that much in Baghdad."

Shadid then went on to talk about the importance of this award and the contributions of his fellow Post correspondents. He said, "It's a first rate group of people that I feel lucky to have worked with and that

reporter **Anthony Shadid** calling from Iraq and at the other end was Executive Editor **Len Downie**. With the phone on speaker so Post colleagues could hear, Downie congratulated Shadid for winning the 2004 Pulitzer Prize for international was over, Downie made sure that Shadid was still on the line and could hear the applause.

With Shadid listening via phone, Downie recognized Shadid for his on-going reporting from Iraq and his desire to remain in Iraq after most news organizations had

Bear Hugs that Help

athleen Dillon, IT, began what she calls her "Bear Hugs" teddy bear ministry a few years ago when she gave a sick friend a teddy bear. She saw the comfort that this cuddly child's toy consolation. Last year she bought and gave away 49 teddy bears.

"The youngest I've given a bear to was five months old and the oldest was in their mid-70s," explained Dillon. "The reasons they needed a teddy bear ranged from heart

could provide to an adult and decided to give away more bears to people who were in need of some surgery to depression and cancer. I hear about situations like a 16-year-old girl with ovarian cancer and send them a teddy bear. It doesn't matter if I know the person, if I think it's a good match, I'll make arrangements to get them a bear."

One of her colleagues in IT, Jeanne Koch, told Dillon about a

four-year-old boy at her church, Columbia Baptist Church in Falls Church, who was having a hard time missing his father who was stationed in the Persian Gulf. A teddy bear was dispatched to the young boy to hug whenever he missed his father.

Koch has provided several connections for Dillon's teddy bear ministry through Columbia Baptist, which includes a preschool, day care and a fine arts institute. "We have access to a lot of community members," said Koch. "It's neat to have these opportunities...a teddy bear is a cheerful reminder that someone cares about you."

Dillon has also used her "Bear Hugs" to help friends and co-workers at The Post. She keeps a few bears in her office to drop off in someone's cubicle if she knows they are having a bad day. One colleague took a bear for company during a hospital stay for surgery.

"We're all kids at heart and we all have bad days," she said. "The bears represent love and security."■

I've learned from and that I've modeled a lot of my work after." He paid special tribute to Post reporter **Rajiv Chandrasekaran** who he described as "incredible."

"As a bureau we've been through moments of tragedy and jubilation, we've been through moments of hope and heartbreak and what's kept this operation together is the staff we have here....it's a group of people who came together right after the war when the city was literally falling apart and they stuck together since then, many of them with us the entire time we've been here. And I don't say this lightly. I think any one of us in this operation would die for the other person."

Shadid recognized The Post for its commitment to covering the story in Iraq and thanked his editors **Phil Bennett** and **David Hoffman** and closed by saying, "this award is as much mine as it theirs, the award is as much mine, as it is the staff in Baghdad."

Downie commented that this is the second year in a row that The Washington Post has won the Pulitzer for international reporting and that Washington Post foreign reporting has been chosen as a finalist in one Pulitzer category or another eight times in the past seven years.

Deputy Editorial Page editors Colby King and Jackson Diehl introduced the newspa-

per's second Pulitzer Prize winner, Anne Applebaum. Her book, The Gulag: A History meticulously describes the history and horror of the death camps of the Soviet Union. Diehl said, "Anne Applebaum decided to tackle this historical deficit." He went on to describe her extensive research efforts to uncover and preserve the story of the Gulag. "The result is her book, The Gulag, a work of stunning power and importance that has won this year's Pulitzer Prize for nonfiction book."

Downie also recognized the five reporters who were finalists for Pulitzer Prizes. Bart Gellman was chosen as a finalist in beat reporting for his coverage of the search for weapons of mass destruction in Iraq. Anne Hull and Tammy Jones were chosen as finalists in feature writing for their stories about three American soldiers being treated at Walter Reed Army Medical Center. Joe Stephens and David Ottaway's investigative series about the Nature Conservancy was a finalist for the award in investigative

reporting.

In his remarks about the finalists, Managing Editor **Steve Coll** noted, "...it's a really remarkable group. I think there are some patterns in this year's three non-winning newspaper finalists and the most prominent and most important of those is the consistent and persistent tireless talent of the five journalists themselves."

Downie also acknowledged the Post writers recognized as finalists for their books: **Dana Priest** for her book *The Mission: Waging War and Keeping Peace with America's Military* and **David Maraniss** for his book *They Marched Into Sunlight.*

Downie closed by saying, "And we continue to lead the way in our coverage of the ongoing situation in Iraq and its growing impact here at home. We thank all of you for your wonderful work last year and the great journalism you are producing this year. And, once again, we hope and pray for the safety of our colleagues bravely working in harm's way."
