of that brings together so many talented journalists of color in one place at the same time. Among them were people we wanted to meet and recruit to work in our newsroom," noted Frazier Page. "At past Unity conventions, The Post participated in the jobs fair and sponsored workshops that not only allowed participants to benefit from the tremendous expertise and skills of our news staff but gave Post recruiters a chance to meet, and in a few cases, hire some extraordinary journalists."

Highlights of the week included the opening event on Sunday, Aug. 1, when The Post hosted a dinner and kicked off a four-day leadership seminar for 15 minority editors from newspapers across the country. On Aug. 2, dozens of high school students and teacher participated in a tour and lunch at The Post, hosted by The Post's Young Journalists Development Program (YJDP) and the Asian American Journalists Association. Several Post reporters met informally with the students for often-lively discussions on the reporters' careers and lives. A similar event for middle and high school students was hosted by the Hispanic Link Journalism Association and YJDP on Thursday.

On Aug. 5, an open house at The Post was held for Unity participants to meet with copy chiefs and assistant managing editors for Metro, Financial and Sports. A writers roundtable led by Post writers **Anne Hull** and **Lonnae O'Neal Parker** was held at the same time.

The highlight of the week was a reception at The Post on Friday, Aug. 6. More than 500 guests attended the event during which the Robert C. Maynard Institute presented its first Vision Award to Ellis Cose, a best-selling author and long-time journalist.
