# Team Effort Behind Post Coverage

t's the summer of big news events. Scheduled only days apart, the 2004 political conventions and Olympics have generated a slew of bylines and photographs in The Post. Behind the comprehensive coverage is months of planning by dozens of Post staff in departments throughout the newspaper.

Jill Grisco, director of news administration services, is responsible for orchestrating The Post's presence at these historic news events. Grisco's efforts include making sure there is enough power for Post computers and printers in Athens. Greece, to reserving hotel rooms for an army of Post reporters and editors in Boston and New York, to having enough band aids for the occasional paper cut.

"It's breathtaking all the details Jill handles for the conventions," said Maralee Schwartz, deputy national editor/politics. "There are so many logistics for hotel and meeting space, food, computers and moving people around. She is a master of all these details that

announced. A barrage of contracts had to be thoroughly reviewed by the Legal Department. "The first thing we did in Legal is look at contracts for hotel rooms," explained **Brenda** 

Boykin, associate counsel. "With a big event like the conventions, you're required to reserve months in advance...it's a lot of paperwork."

forms needed to have The Post's equipment shipped to Greece and then make it's way through customs. According to Boykin, Legal staff arranged for power of attorney to be given to a customs broker in Greece to accept the shipments, filled out a number of declaration forms and obtained the proper signatures for contacts.

**Terry Wilson**, director of risk management for The Washington Post Company and **Mary Dimos**, risk man-

agement specialist, have the responsibility for making sure that all The Post's valuable assets including people and equipment are properly insured and make it to their destinations without problems. "We have to show proof of insurance to coordinators at these events," said Wilson. "Without those papers, a lot of them won't let us in."

Dimos also assisted Grisco by providing her with a name

of a friend in Greece who was hired to be a translator for the reporters covering the Olympics. Dimos' friend Margaret Heliotis, who received her master's degree from Georgetown University, teaches at the college-level in Greece. According to Grisco, Heliotis got a running start helping out on several stories during the week leading up to the opening ceremony, including Peter Carlson's story "On Their Marks" in Style last Friday, Aug. 13.

Electricity is one of the most basic and vital needs at the conventions and Olympics. Building electrician **Steve Bresnahan** and the electricians planned for plenty of electrical power at the three events. Working with Grisco, Bresnahan did a detailed layout of the designated space and determined where power should go for the workstations and the coffeepots.

Plans for plugging into Greek outlets became compliand are expected to make the trip to the 2006 Winter Olympics in Turin, Italy and the 2008 Summer Olympics in Beijing, China.

News IT staff led by Newsroom Technology Editor **Ed Rossi** spent months preparing

for any technical contingencies at the events. News IT staff have also been on site in Boston and Athens (and will be in New York) to make sure the technology needed to get the coverage into the paper works smoothly.

"A mammoth amount of work has gone into the logistics and technology required to support these events, said Rossi. "From travel and lodging, to credentials, security, laptops, training, and setup of our workspaces at the venues, virtually every staff member in News Information Technology has played some role in the preparations. It's been a real team effort, and we could

Central IT," Systems manager Chris White e-mailed last week from Athens. "The highspeed network link that connects us to Washington was up and running when I arrived. Within a few hours of hitting the ground our Athens bureau was up and [columnist Michael] Wilbon was e-mailing his fans around the globe. Other news organizations have spent long, hot days untangling computer problems with friendly Greek technicians who don't always

share the sense of urgency."

Circulation staff were also on site in Boston and will soon be traveling to New York. In Boston, Andy Denault, Mike Towle, Bill Benner and recent retiree Diane Prather (a veteran of several conventions) could be found as early as 4 a.m. checking the 22 convention hotels to make sure they received copies of The Post's daily convention coverage special sections. The sections were delivered to the rooms of District. Maryland and Virginia delegates and to pop-up displays in lobbies.

Denault made arrangements for the *Boston Herald*, where he worked more than two decades ago, to print the daily special sections which were transmitted electronically from The Post. Every day, The Post's special sec-

tions, along with a mountain of other newspapers and magazines, had to be delivered to a holding yard before 3:30 a.m. All the publications were radiated by X-ray and carefully checked by the Secret Service before they could be

delivered inside the convention center.

Later this month, the special sections with coverage of the Republican National Convention will be printed by the publishing subsidiary of the *Bergen* (N.J.) *Record* for distribution at Madison Square

Garden and New York hotels.

There are a number of other departments that worked with Grisco to ensure The Post's success this summer, including the Northwest Health Center, Purchasing, the carpenters, Building Services, Security, and The Washington Post Company subsidiary Washingtonpost. Newsweek Interactive.
