Big Night at The Post

undreds of Post employees spent Monday evening, Dec. 6 enjoying a festive winter wonderland and honoring four of their colleagues during the newspaper's biggest employee event of the year – the 21st annual Eugene Meyer Awards.

Chairman **Don Graham** and Publisher **Bo Jones** presented The Post's highest employee honor to **Dan Balz**, News; **Walter Fletcher**, Building Services; **Phil Hottle**, Circulation and **Lee McAdory**, Circulation, during the event held in the Northwest Building's auditorium and multipurpose room.

During his comments at the beginning of the awards ceremony, Graham asked past winners of the Eugene Meyer Award to stand and be recognized. "This is an astonishing group of people that Dan, Walter, Phil and Lee are joining."

"It's hard putting out a daily newspaper," he continued. "No one outside this process understands it. You stick your 35

Bo Jones pro-

vided insight Lee McAc into the work and accomplishments of each of the four men which earned them the prestigious award. They in turn thanked their coworkers and families for their successful careers at The Post.

"The universal respect for Dan has enabled him to develop a broad range of sources from both [political] parties and all ideologies," explained Jones in his remarks honoring national reporter Dan Balz. Jones also included comments from Executive Editor Len Downie who said of Balz, "In an ocean of chaos on primary and election nights, Dan is the island of reason and calm on which the rest of us rely."

Jones lauded 31-year Post veteran Walter Fletcher for his behind-the-scenes hard work in Building Services at the Northwest Building. He noted that during the 1991 United Way campaign, Fletcher retrieved an estimated \$30,000 in United Way checks and cash that were in two boxes that were inadvertently thrown away. He followed The Post's ink-covered trash to a landfill in Virginia and sifted through it to find the lost donations.

During his comments about home delivery managers Phil Hottle and Lee McAdory, Jones noted, "It's hard to appreciate home delivery unless you are involved in it. The rest of us see the hysteria caused on the rare occasion when delivery fails. We notice when it is accomplished in even the most foul weather when even the Postal Service gives up. But

day in and day out, it doesn't matter what great journalism we produce or advertising we sell or color we print, if the paper doesn't get delivered in time. it doesn't matter."

Both of the circulation award winners praised the hard work of The Post's independent distributors and zone managers in their speeches. They were also effusive in their thanks to the newspaper's leadership and the Graham family.

"I never had the opportunity to meet Eugene Meyer," remarked Hottle, "but he must have been a heck of a guy."
