An Artist Emerges

iffany Yancey has been drawing and painting since she was a young girl growing up in
Philadelphia. Through high school and college, she never considered pursuing her pas-

sion for art as a way to make money. But that changed in January, when she launched a Web site and online art gallery, www.tiffanyyanceyart.com.

While she was pursuing her communications degree from Temple University, she took an occasional art class and attended summer arts programs at the Moore College of Art. However, she decided that her career path would be in sales and in the summer of 2000 she moved from Philadelphia to Laurel,

> Md. and was hired as a telephone sales representative in the Advertising Department.

It was three years ago when she moved into a bigger house in Greenbelt, Md. that Yancey decided that she wanted to decorate her home with her own art, instead of prints of someone else's art. Using bright, vivid colors she created African American paintings that celebrate the female form, romance and love.

"It's the kind of art that I

like to see," said Yancey referring to the up-beat themes and colors in her paintings. "When you walk into a house every day and see an image that uplifts your spirit, that's what I want to accomplish."

Her home became her art gallery where she displayed her paintings done in acrylics on canvas. Her friends and family were so impressed with her talent that they encouraged her to "put it out there" and sell her paintings.

"I was surprised by the reaction of people to my art," she said. "It gave me the encouragement to pursue my artistic goals. I didn't want to be in my 50s or 60s regretting
