Don's Door

ave you seen Don's door? It's a question that has come up in the last couple of months at staff meetings and hallway conversations at The Post. A peek at Chairman **Don Graham**'s new door has been a highlight for staff and visitors who

A careful look at the door will reveal the old "-30-" mark, no longer used by reporters to indicate the end of a story, as well as "balance your budget" and "deadline," which are still

oft used terms at the newspaper. There are also several engravings including a linotype machine and the Smithsonian Castle on the National Mall.

Lloyd Schermer, the artist who created the door, is the retired president and chairman of Lee Enterprises, the Iowabased parent company of 58 daily newspapers in 23 states throughout the U.S. After a long and successful career in the newspaper industry,

Schermer retired in 1991 and in 1993 began a second career as an artist.

A longtime Graham family friend, Schermer worked closely with Katharine Graham on legislative and other industry issues facing their media companies and subsequently became friends with her

son, Don. "He was one of the people in the newspaper industry that she really admired," explains Graham.

It was about two years ago that Schermer, a past chair and member of the Smithsonian's National Board of Directors, was in town for a meeting at the Smithsonian and visited Graham at The Post. Schermer showed Graham a print of his work using wood type, which had just been commissioned by the

The type is made from several woods, including beech, birch, maple and mahogany and was used in the 1800s,

according to Schermer, who notes that he has the largest collection of antique wood type in the country. Years of use and aging have given each piece a rich patina. The door, which he estimates to be between 200 and 300 pounds, was made in his studio outside Aspen, Colo., and shipped to The Post this summer.

While this is his first commissioned door, Schermer has created several journalistic themed artworks using his ters in Davenport, Iowa.

During a visit with Graham last week, Schermer mentioned that he is in discussions with the *New York Times* for a similar project.

"But we got it first," said Graham with a smile. ■
