

Northwest Fitness Center to Open April 12

The much anticipated Northwest Building Fitness Center is scheduled to open April 12. The following information about the Fitness Center was provided by **Mary Ann Werner**, vice president/counsel.

e are happy to announce that the new Fitness Center at the Northwest Building will open on April 12. The Fitness Center is located on the first

floor of the L Street Building, where the old Sousa Conference Room used to be. We're still finishing construction, so we ask you to refrain from visiting until the contractors are gone and we're open for business.

A team of employees from various departments have participated in the facility's design and the decisions about its operation, and we're grateful for their efforts. We think vou'll like the results.

The Fitness Center will have treadmills, bikes, elliptical trainers, a set of weight machines and free weights (up to 25 lbs.). A trainer will be available on a part-time basis to orient new members. There is a separate room for classes, and we plan to have outside instructors provide yoga, aerobics, Jazzercise, Pilates and other classes. We will adjust the class offerings depending upon our members' interests. The facility contains locker rooms with showers.

This will largely be a self-service facility, open 24 hours a day, seven days a week. During April we will offer orientation sessions on use of the equipment, and the facility will be open to anyone who wants to try it out.

Starting in May, we will charge a small membership fee to help cover equipment maintenance and replacement and the cost of the trainer. Membership fees will vary

based on an employee's salary and will range from \$5 to \$15 per month. Membership fees will be handled through payroll deduction.

# News and Circulation Award Winners

ith the journalism awards season well underway, Newsroom staff have been reaping numerous honors for their work during 2005. Here are some of the latest:

Scott Higham and Bob **O'Harrow** are the recipients of the Investigative Reporters and Editors (IRE) award for

investigative reporting in the category of newspapers with a circulation greater than 500.000. The two were honored for their reporting on the series "The High Price of Homeland Security," which uncovered problems facing the Department of Homeland Security and prompted a Congressional investigation.

The IRE is a 4,500-member professional and educational organization based at the Missouri School of Journalism. The contest, which began in 1979, recognizes outstanding investigative work each year and this year received 563 entries, according to information on the organization's Web site.

The Virginia Press Association (VPA) presented The Post with 24 awards in its large paper division on March 25 during its annual meeting in Roanoke. Style reporter DeNeen Brown won a Bestin-Show award in the daily

writing category for her "Go to Sleep" story on the District's homeless population. Brown also received a first place award in the feature story writing category. According to

The classes offered by outside instructors will be priced separately, and class fees will be paid directly to the instructor. The personal trainer will be available for individual sessions and to help members design a fitness program for a separate fee as well. We expect the facility to be a bit crowded initially, so we hope you'll be patient, especially during the first month or so.

### Fitness Center Membership Fee

There will be a small membership fee to cover the cost of equipment maintenance and replacement and to pay for a part-time trainer. If you become a Fitness Center member, the fee will be automatically deducted from your paycheck. Classes provided by outside instructors will be priced separately and class fees will be paid directly to the instructor. You must be a member of the Fitness Center to take any fitness classes. The membership fee is determined by salary level (see chart).

### Hours

The Fitness Center will be open 24 hours a day, seven days a week. It will not be supervised, but members will be able to access the center with their Post ID card.
