

"Proliferation of Education and Information" Reaching the Remotest Parts of the World Through Internet

ome eople are reluctant to donate their time or money to charity, when the impact of their goodwill is not transparent. Selftaught software engineer **Bart Solowiej**, IT, doesn't have that problem.

Solowiej, 25, recently took vacation and helped connect a small indigenous town, which sits 8,400 feet above sea level, to the rest of the world. Though it's a 10-hour bus ride from Guatemala's capital of high speed Internet at a high school in the Mayan town of San Mateo Ixtatán .

The Emory University economics and mathematics graduate who traveled to Guatemala under the auspice of the Ixtatan Foundation based in Charlottesville, Va., said that he saw an opportunity for the "proliferation of education and information."

"There are very few educators willing to travel that far and live there," Solowiej explained. "So this provides a model for an alternative way to educate not just in Guatemala, but any remote location in the world."

"Guatemala is a fascinating place because the government recognizes the potential," he added. "They are in the early stages of a very robust infrastructure for delivering information. They already have high school courses and degrees that are earned through a radio

broadcast." Although he was there for two weeks, he wishes he could have stayed longer. He realized that without educating people on the systems, the computers are "just boxes."

In order to remain in the club, students have to attend mandatory programs set up by The Post that are designed to supplement the students' education.

With the full support of Chairman **Don Graham**, The Post "adopted" Eastern High School in 1986. Over the past 20 years, the newspaper has

donated over \$2.1 million in scholarships and assisted 1,241 students. Graham and Publisher **Bo Jones** were both present to greet, welcome and have lunch with the students, mentors and school teachers who make the program possible.

After an ice-breaker session conducted by **Peter Joseph** from Organizational Development and Training, the attendees were treated to lunch in the Multipurpose Room at the Northwest Building. Graham welcomed the students and acknowledged the importance of the teachers and Post employees

who volunteer to mentor the students.

At the recommendation of **Arthur Fuller** from IT, motivational speaker Janice Ferebee was invited to give the keynote address. Ferebee, who has been recognized nationally by Oprah Winfrey is president of Ferebee Enterprises International—a nonprofit organization that focuses on promoting adolescent self-esteem. As the students, mentors and teachers finished lunch, Ferebee captivated her audience with an enthusiastic and energetic interactive session that was more participatory than a one-way keynote address. Walking around the room and asking questions, she projected the same assertiveness and self-confidence that she instructed the students to always demand.
