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# The Washington Post Company Hosts Energy Conference

he Washington
Post Company
hosted a conference to explore
America's energy
future on Nov. 8. Underwritten by advertising client and
French energy multinational
conglomerate AREVA, the

conference assembled what Washington Post Company Vice President **Pat Butler** described as an "all-star cast of people" that included the secretary of energy, the vice-chairman of Chevron, a former chairman of the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission, four members of con-

gress, and leading scientists and environmental experts. Former Post national energy correspondent and business editor Peter Behr moderated the discussions.

During the congressional panel, a "mini-conference" developed in which Republi-

can senators and Democratic house members began negotiating compromise provisions of the energy bill currently pending in Congress.

"It was great to see it, and we're happy to have provided the forum for it," Butler said.

"About six months ago, we decided to start a formal conference operation here at the company," explains Butler, who led the initiative. "When Nancy Parke told us that the AREVA energy company was interested in underwriting a conference on energy, we took that as our first project, and Amer Yaqub,

**Carlos Silva** and I became the conference division."

Butler explained that a conference underwriter

must agree to invest at least \$500,000 in new incremental advertising in The Post and washingtonpost.com, and that The Post Company must have "strict editorial independence" in planning the conference. He noted that Rep.





issues." He said, "Washingtonpost.com is a great partner in this effort and will post highlights of these conferences for the benefit of its nine million highly interested and influential readers around the world."

Silva said, "The Washington Post Company has done high level events in the past and Pat Butler has been instrumental in making these possible. Now we are creating these events as value-added opportunities for our advertising clients on a more systematic basis. The AREVA conference demonstrated that The Post Company can serve a client's interest beyond the pages of the paper while also contributing to the public dialogue on important national and international issues."

Butler hopes to have future conferences on issues like health care, agriculture and technology, at least quarterly in 2008 and perhaps more frequently in 2009. He was encouraged by the major stories written by the Associated Press, Reuters and Bloomberg, and he hopes to secure live C-SPAN coverage for future conferences. The caliber of panelists, the "ter-

rific logistical execution,"

as his assistant Cheryl Davis,
and "very good prospects" for
future sponsorships led Butler
to conclude, "We're off to a
good start in making conferences a very good business
for our company."


## E-Streeters Luncheon
