hen it came to community involvement, it was business as usual for The Post in 2007. And by "usual," The Post

> found new and creative ways to partner up with its community for the better good and to deliver a newspaper, whose "duty is to its readers and to the public at large," as Eugene Meyer stipulated back on March 5, 1935. Perhaps the most vivid example of this "duty" came on Feb. 18, 2007, when reporters Dana Priest and Anne Hull, along with photographer Michel du Cille and editor David

Maraniss, revealed the substandard outpatient care at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in an article titled, "Soldiers Face received \$2,000 scholarships Neglect, Frustration each. At Army's Top Medical Facility." Within

weeks, the secretary of the Army and the Walter Reed commander were fired, the Army surgeon general resigned and President Bush apologized.

Additionally, The Post sponsored events and festivals such as the **SPEAKERS BUREAU, BLACK FAMILY REUNION, LA FERIA DE LA FAMILIA, KOMEN NATIONAL** RACE FOR THE CURE®. FREDDIE MAC HOOPS FOR THE **HOMELESS**® and many others. It also donated \$169,519 in employee matching gifts and through the Contributions program, a total of \$735,782.50 were donated to 265 nonprofit organizations. The PostPoints awards program also partnered up with the Greater D.C. Cares to offer Post readers more volunteering opportunities. Individual employees also donated their personal time and money. The newsroom collected and donated \$15.439.35 to N STREET VIL-**LAGE** during its annual Cookie and Cook Book Sale. Aurora Gonzalez, Public Relations. took time off from work and

paid her way to El Salvador to do missionary work.
