# Bradlee Honored with Lifetime Achievement Award

ice President at Large **Ben Bradlee** just might be one of the most influential American newspaper editors of all time, at least if the University of Illinois has anything to say about it. On Oct. 24 in the Newseum atrium, Bradlee became only the second recipient of the university's Illinois Prize for Lifetime Achievement in Journalism—an honor bestowed on longtime "60 Minutes" co-anchor Mike Wallace last year.

Apart from Bradlee's Post fam-

ily, including his wife Sally Quinn, Post Co. Chairman Don Graham, Publisher Katharine Weymouth, and Post colleagues and friends like Mary Hadar, David Ignatius, Peter Perl, George Solomon, Bob Woodward and others, a who's who of journalists were also on deck to honor Bradlee. Recent presidential debate moderators Bob Schieffer from CBS and Jim Lehrer from PBS where present, as were NBC journalists Andrea Mitchell (with husband, former chairman of the Federal Reserve, Alan Greenspan) and Hardball host Chris Matthews, among many oth-

ers.

Walt Harrington, head of the university's journalism program, opened the evening and said, "Ben's journalism has always made noise. Ben's journalism showed no favorites." Then, he thanked

Bradlee and said,
"You've had a good life

it's a life that's made
many lives better."

Newseum Executive
Director and Senior
Vice President Joe
Urschel first described
the 74-foot-high marble
engraving of the First
Amendment on the
Newseum's façade and
then said, "Few Americans have done more to
defend and uphold
those ideas than
tonight's honoree Ben
Bradlee and we thank
you for that."

Post Co. Chairman Don Graham said that Bradlee was his mother's (**Katharine** 

Graham) "greatest deci-

sion" and called him the "greatest editor of his time and one of the greatest people we all know and love."

Ben you're the best of the best and there isn't a day that goes by that I don't miss you. Congratulations on a job well done. I wish I could be there with you tonight." Weymouth then said, "Ben, grandma speaks for me too. I love you

and I consider myself lucky to have you, Sally and Quinn in my life."

But the night was not all serious. It would have been impossible to truly capture the essence of Bradlee without any anecdotes of Bradlee's often foul-mouthed, tough-asnails irreverence.

Weymouth joked that in a 1964 letter between Bradlee and Mrs. Graham, Bradlee said, "I'd give my left one to become managing editor of The Washington Post." "Soon enough Ben become manag-

#### Northwest Health Center to Close

The Northwest Building Health Center will close on Jan. 1, 2009. In a memo to all Post employees, Vice President **Peggy Schiff**, Finance and HR, wrote, "After making several changes over the years to our NW Health Center, we have concluded that continuing its operation is no longer viable in the current business climate." Schiff explained that when the production facility was co-located

at the Northwest location, it justified having an on-site facility to handle productionrelated injuries.

Starting in 2009, The Post's Security Department will handle responses to medical emergencies—just as they do today during those hours when the Health Center is closed. Additionally, other programs will continue, like EAP counseling, ergonomics, flu shot administration and blood drives.
