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# In Good Company

For more than a half century, The Washington Post has prided itself on being a newspaper dedicated to seven principles—standards of excellence for the conduct of a newspaper—established in 1935 by Eugene Meyer, father of chairman of the board of The Washington Post Company KATHARINE GRAHAM. The Eugene Meyer Award was established to annually recognize one or more employees who have helped The Post live up to Mr. Meyer's principles of good journalism, good business and hard work.

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humility, appreciation and humor in accepting the award.

Publisher DON GRAHAM addressed the honorees and the third-floor standing-room-only crowd-which included Security's JACK HENDERSON who received a warm round of applause led by Graham. Graham introduced Carper, Oremland and Pendergast, "three great people who exemplify everything that makes up good newspapers. This award is a tribute to how we made it to where we are today. The Post's survival is due to the day-to-day jobs of good people. It is made of great moments; not a 100-yard dash, but a marathon."

For Katharine Graham, the annual Eugene Meyer Awards give her "an excuse to look back on the history of the paper." And still more was made at the ceremony: Mrs. Graham pointed out that this was the first year the award went to women. She touched on her own role in the newspaper business and shared some memories of her father, Eugene Meyer. "I wish more of you knew my father," Mrs. Graham said, "he was a man who felt very strongly about his community and the country, and tonight's recipients personify those values he cared most about."

Carper reminisced about her years

with Eugene Meyer and the "family atmosphere" that permeated The Post in its early struggling years. Her Post career began in the Library and moved to the newsroom to fill a void of reporters because of World War II. Although Carper, like other United States wartime-affected women, had signed an agreement to give up her position when the men came back from the war, she was one of the few who managed to keep her job and go on to build a career. Credited with a professionalism that allowed her to cover presidential speeches and conduct exclusive interviews on the stark realities of the civil rights movement among other journalistic responsibilities, Carper became a familiar headliner. Yet with accomplishments ranging from Librarian to fill-in City editor, from Religious reporter to Style editor and from National reporter to Personnel manager, Carper still humbly attributes her success to being "enormously lucky." One of Carper's

nieces, Amy Plummer, also spoke about luck, but in a different manner: "We have always said that we had the best of two worlds. In addition to a devoted mother, we were lucky enough to have Elsie."

For weeks before the ceremony, Oremland had been inviting people to her "coronation," and there wasn't anyone who would have denied her the pleasure of that honor. In fact, those who work with her could go along with a "coronation," for they know Oremland is the Queen of Sales. She sold her first classified ad in 1938. Today, she has a desk full of accounts and a long line of happy customers. Her charming adaptability and selling in-stinct combine perfectly for ad sales to restaurants because Oremland can "be" Italian, Greek, French or Irish. And Oremland wouldn't shy away from rolling up her sleeves and helping in the kitchen if that's what her customer needed. Advertising Sales' DARLENE McGIVERON jokes that Oremland has taught her "just by sheer osmosis-sitting across from her." In McGiveron's eyes, Oremland is "the best example to follow if you want to be good at working with people." Oremland praised her husband, Sol, for giving her the necessary support over the years. It was obvious that his pride was only matched by hers.

"Today, we have more plants than we had presses when I first started working here," said Pendergast, assistant production manager, remembering aloud the way things were when he first found his way into The Post's pressroom. There were only two presses and they were "old and second-hand." But Pendergast spoke with the excitement of a World Series announcer as he verbally turned Post pages from the second-hand presses to the present chapters of The Post as "the front-runner of new ideas and technology." Little did anyone know that the 1950 flyboy had such big things up his sleeve for The Post's pressroom—presses that would



revolutionize the newspaper industry. Don Graham informed everyone that Pendergast "speaks in two languages-English and pressroom," and went on to salute him as a "craftsman's craftsman." Graham praised him for his tireless struggle with the TKS press in Springfield "until it worked and worked as good as any newspaper's in the country." Graham also cited Pendergast's current involvement in Flexography. Pendergast became father of The Post's Flexo project and his devotion to pressroom improvements has become widely known. The Flexo crew uses words such as "expert," "dedicated," "striving" and "the best," to describe him. And when asked to sum Pendergast up in one word, Flexo crew chief K. C. CHIN said, "In a nutshell, he's a genius."
